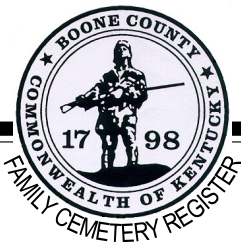


# Limaburg Cemetery

## COMMENTS:

Limaburg Road was once part of the turnpike system that connected Burlington and other parts of Boone County, Kentucky, with Covington in Kenton County. It was known as the Anderson Ferry Turnpike between Constance or Anderson Ferry and the Burlington/Florence Turnpike. The intersection with the Burlington/Florence Turnpike was then called Florence Cross Roads. See Lake's 1883 Atlas.

In William Conrad's *"A Journey into the Past"* page 29 we find:

"A few miles south of Burlington is Limaburg, where the roads from Hebron and Constance once intersected the Florence & Burlington turnpike. At one time called Needmore, it was later called Florence Cross Roads. There the main road from Burlington to Cincinnati turned northerly and to Constance, and from that point followed the Ohio River to Ludlow and Covington. The hamlet was named Limaburg when a post office was established a century ago.

"Limaburg boasted a general store, blacksmith shop, steam saw mill, a schoolhouse and a tollgate. Near by was a mineral spring which had water similar to Big Bone water, but not as strong nor did it have the Big Bone odor: Boone County Recorder 2 Dec, 1908.

Another road, a continuation of the North Bend Road, now known as the Hebron-Limaburg Road, once ran along the creek to the Gunpowder Baptist Church with a branch south. Old records refer to this as North Bend Road, but in the late 1800's it was more or less a wagon road leading to farms. It was in the creek probably as much as being out of it.

A Beemon cemetery once existed on this road, but has been lost and never found because of failure to record on maps. It is now legendary.

Located edge of hilltop, south of runway. No stones except one limestone field, 1 out of place dressed limestone monument base. Four cedars mark corners? 1 living, 3 stumps, very bumpy inside wood lot - moved?
